

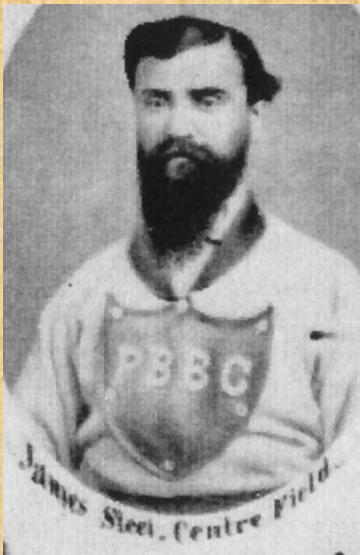
The First Nine of the Pioneer Base Ball Club 1866



Joseph Buchtel - Left Field

Age 35 Photographer

Joseph Buchtel was one of the principle founders of the Pioneer Club. He had come by covered wagon to Portland in 1852 and built one of the first half dozen buildings there. He owned and operated the first photographic studio in Portland and was well versed in all the photographic techniques of the day. He took many of the early photos of Portland and these photos of the team members were almost certainly shot in his studio. In 1868, Buchtel was elected President of The Oregon and Washington and Idaho Territories Association of Base Ball Players. It was reported that Buchtel could run 150 yards in 15 seconds.



James Steel - Center Field

Age 32 Banker

Mr. Steel came to Portland in 1862. After working as a grocer for two years, he went to work for the 1st National Bank of Portland as a cashier, where he worked for 16 years. In 1883 he helped organize the Willamette Savings Bank and served as its first president. His brother George was also a member of the team.



Ed Quackenbush - Pitcher

Age 26 Bookkeeper

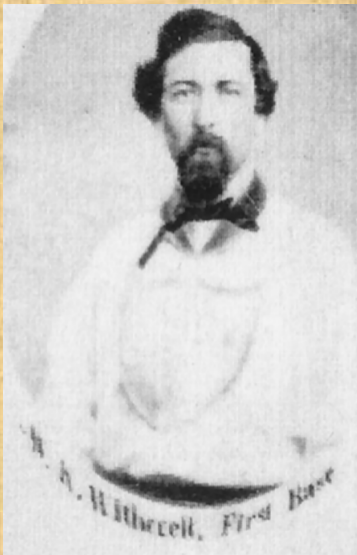
Mr. Quackenbush also owned a business selling hard-wood for carriages.

Age 18 Clerk at Express Office

At age 63, Mr. Warren and his wife were traveling as 1st Class passengers on the Titanic in 1912 when it sank on its maiden voyage. Mr. Warren helped his wife into a lifeboat and then stepped back. His body, if recovered, was never identified.



Theodore F. Miner - Catcher

Age and Occupation unknown
